#### From the Surgery Newsletter

#### COVID and Flu Vaccinations Autumn/Winter 2025

Covid vaccinations will be available from **early October** for the over-75s, and the immunosuppressed. We will have 1330 doses of flu vaccine available from October 1st (September 15th for pregnant women). We started booking appointments at the Open Day on



**Saturday August 30th.** Electronic booking for appointments will be available with text and email links being sent out. Please tell us in advance if you are: the main carer for, or sharing a home with, someone who is immunocompromised, or you are a frontline health worker.

#### **Ordering prescriptions**

We no longer take requests for prescriptions over the phone. The most effective and safest way to order your prescriptions is via email into the Surgery on **courtyardsys.wiltshire@nhs.net** or using the Airmid App. Please list what you want rather than just writing 'everything on my squirrel' to avoid missing something or us prescribing the wrong size tablets. If you find that a stock of something is building up, do not order this item until your stock is used up.

If you normally require a blood test or blood pressure readings with your prescription, please email the surgery about 3 weeks before your prescription is due, and we will call you to make an appointment. Or you can phone us. We can now do most blood tests between 8am and 3.3opm. There is a special clinic from **7am on Wednesdays** for people who need to see us early because of work, and blood test appointments can be made then.

Pharmacies, both local and online, are suffering shortages of medications, and instead of getting two deliveries a day of whatever they needed, the pharmacists often have to phone around for items, or ask us for replacement prescriptions when items are not available.

Because of changes made by NHS England, pharmacies now want 10 days to prepare prescriptions. Please request prescriptions when you still have 14 days supply left.

In July we ran a stall at the Village Fete selling fresh produce, which was well supported by Mothers' Union members and friends. Two days after the Fete we had an afternoon of contemplative meditation which was led by Reverend Caroline Spindlow. This introduced us to 'Lectio Devina', a traditional Christian practice of Scriptural reading, meditation, prayer and contemplation.

#### **Black Dog Crossroads**

The work to install traffic lights at Black Dog crossroads will start on **Wednesday 3rd September**, when SSE will begin to install the electrical supply that will power the traffic lights. This phase involves excavating a trench and laying approximately 550 metres of new cable, primarily within the carriageway from near Frieth Farm to the crossroads. Temporary two-way signals will be in place during this period, transitioning to four-way signals as work reaches the junction. This initial work is expected to be completed by **Monday 19th October**. Following this, the traffic signal installation will begin on **20th October**, with the work expected to be completed in **February 2026**.

Temporary signals will be in operation on the A360 during the traffic light installation, and the side roads will be closed. Wiltshire Council will be in contact with local businesses to ensure access is maintained during the closures.

In addition to the signal installation and speed limit changes, the scheme will also include drainage system repairs and carriageway resurfacing, helping to prevent future issues and reduce long-term disruption.

The test is not intended to alert you to real danger and you will not need to take any further action.

#### A Greengage Summer?


You know that the weather has been unusual when the Editor of this publication asks you to write about it! But how abnormal has it been? Inevitably, comparisons are drawn with the long hot summer of 1976, and the scorched lawns and half-empty reservoirs do seem very familiar. But what are the facts?

According to the Meteorological Office, the average temperature in the summer (i.e. the months of June, July and August) of 1976 was 17.72°C. At the time of writing, the average for this year here in West Lavington may exceed this - the current mean is 18.1°C, but it looks as if this summer is going to end on a chilly note. If a new record is set, it will in large part have been due to the four heatwaves we have, unusually, experienced this year. However we should not think these two years are unique; before 1976 the hottest summer (at 17.61°C) was in 1826!

Does this year's summer provide evidence for global warming? On its own, the short answer is 'no'. Lots of things affect our weather, such as volcanic eruptions, solar storms and changes in sea temperatures on the other side of the world, not to mention CO2, so we should expect significant changes from year to year. My records here in West Lavington, which start in 2008, show no obvious trend, but we should probably go back further in time. However, since 1985, annual records from the Meteorological Office show an unmistakable upward trend. Indeed the average temperatures have been rising since about 1900, with a slight pause during the 1950s.

There are some other aspects about this year's weather here in West Lavington that are worth noting. After one of the wettest autumns last year and a wet winter, the rain suddenly stopped and we had the driest spring I have recorded. What little rain we have had since has failed to resuscitate the lawns, or fill the brooks; farmers and gardeners are recording severely reduced harvests. However it is an ill wind that blows nobody any good and the weather in the spring has proved ideal for all trees with stoned fruits such as plums and, as I can confirm from my own garden, greengages. It looks like being a good year for apples too.

#### September in the Garden – Building Climate Resilience

As the seasons shift, our gardens are feeling the effects of unpredictable weather, scorching heat one week, heavy downpours the next. My poor garden is looking very sorry for itself now that I've had to put the hosepipe away. September is a good moment to prepare your garden for these extremes.

Start with the soil. Healthy soil acts like a sponge in wet weather and holds moisture in dry spells. Adding a thick

layer of mulch, such as soil improver, compost, or well-rotted bark, will protect the surface, feed the life beneath, and improve structure for the year ahead. I've been using Apsley Farms soil improver, delivered free to the village, laid after a good rain soak.



Think about plant diversity. A mix of drought-tolerant, deep-rooted species such as rosemary, Verbena bonariensis, lavender, Perovskia, and Sedum (Hylotelephium) alongside moisture lovers helps your garden cope with whatever nature throws at it. September is an ideal time for planting perennials and shrubs. The soil is warm and autumn rain helps them establish strong roots without daily watering.

Leave seedheads on some plants to feed birds and shelter insects over winter. A resilient garden survives the weather, supports wildlife, and keeps thriving.

Finally, If you've been caught out by downpours, a water butt stores rain for dry spells. Even a small barrel makes a difference and rainwater is far better for plants than tap water. I've got a gutter leading from my water butt overflow into my pond.

#### **POSTERS FOR NEWS & VIEWS**

Some of the artwork for posters we receive are excellent but needs to be redone because the file size and text are too small for printing or it won't work in greyscale. If you are supplying a poster for an event, the file size as a jpg will need to be a minumum of 1.5Mb and will be RGB.

You also need to ensure it will work in greyscale, as the magazine is printed in black & white. The colour version goes online.



#### Don't fall for a scam email

After a family member was caught out by an email phishing scam, a News and Views reader has asked us if we could highlight email scams and offer advice on how to spot them.

Scam emails look like the real thing, but contain links and attachments designed to steal your money or information. The message

might be from a company you don't normally receive communications from, or someone you do not know. Scammers send 'urgent' emails pretending to be from the government, banks, credit card companies, shops and other trusted organisations, using the same logo and a similar email address as the real organisation. They can also copy or 'spoof' the email address of an organisation.

Often, the purpose of a scam email is to get you to click on a link. This will take you to a website which might download a virus to your computer, or steal passwords or other personal information. They usually try to trick you into going to the site - for example to update your password to avoid your account being suspended. The embedded link in the email itself goes to a website that looks exactly like the real thing but is actually a fake designed to trick victims into entering personal information.

#### A scam email may:

- ask you to confirm your banking details so they can give you a 'refund';
- provide you with a phone number to call urgently;
- make a threat, such as immediate arrest, deportation, or blackmail;
- threaten to stop a service or charge a fine if you don't act;
- state you've been a victim of identity crime and offering compensation or help to recover money lost to scams.

#### Pointers to fake emails:

- The email is sent from a free web mail address.
- The email does not use your proper name, but a non-specific greeting like 'dear customer'.
- A sense of urgency for example the threat that unless you act immediately your account may be closed.
- A prominent website link. These can be forged or seem very similar to the proper address, but even a single character's difference means a different website.
- A request for personal information, such as user name, password or bank details.
- You weren't expecting to get an email from the company that appears to have sent it. The entire text of the email is contained within an image rather than the usual text format. (The image contains an embedded hyperlink to a bogus site.)

#### Stop and think!

Don't be bounced into reacting to an email. If an email doesn't look or sound right, or you are in any way suspicious about it, ask yourself the following questions:

- Is the email unexpected?
- Is it asking you to do something?
- Are there spelling or grammar errors?
- Is the email asking for an urgent response?
- Is the 'from' email address a valid, known address?
- Is there a link to click on?

If the answer to any of these is yes, then it may be a scam. Do not reply to the email or use any information in the email, including phone numbers. Do not click on any links or attachments.

If the email is from a friend, but they are asking for assistance or money, or the text doesn't seem right, call them directly to check that the email really is from them. Their email account may have been hacked.

If the email is from a company or other official body such as banks, doctors, etc., contact them directly via phone or text but DO NOT reply to the email.

You can check the email sender's address by right clicking on the 'From' name at the top of the email. You can also check the destination of any link in the email by rolling your mouse over the link - the true destination will be displayed in the bottom left corner of your screen. Beware if this is different to the address in the link.

#### An email you don't like the look of? Report it!

If you have received an email which you're not quite sure about, you can forward it to report@phishing.gov.uk The National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC) will then analyse the suspect email and any websites it links to. They'll use any additional information you provide to look for and monitor suspicious activity. You can forward as many suspicious emails to them as you like - even if you're not certain it's a scam, the NCSC will check. Whilst the NCSC is unable to inform you of the outcome of its review, they can confirm that they do act upon every message received. Your report of a phishing email will help them to act quickly, protecting many more people from being affected.

I hope you all had a lovely summer and found some time to enjoy the sunshine, see friends and family and have at least one BBQ! The weather has been amazing, although my lawn would disagree if it could talk. The Crammer in Devizes it is now nearly empty - I have never seen that despite having lived in the Devizes area my entire life.

If you have been through Market Lavington and Easterton you will have seen the lovely new road surface and pristine lining that has been completed. Thank you to everyone who, like me, has had to plan ahead to avoid the road closures, take diversions and put up with confused motorists at each end of the road. It has been painful at times, especially for those living along the site or operating a business in the Market Place. I found the contractors to be incredibly helpful and polite, and the job looks to have been done well. I think we can all breathe a sigh of relief.

The long-awaited update to Black Dog crossroads, which neighbouring councillor Tamara Reay and I secured last year, will begin this month. The difficult bit has always been getting electricity to the site without relying on landowners along the stretch. There will be a period of temporary traffic lights as a feed is brought up the road from the Freith direction. Before long we will have traffic lights and a reduced speed limit of 40mph in place. I am looking forward to having a solution to the ongoing accidents at the junction once and for all.

On to far more troubling news. We had an incident in Market Lavington in August when a teenager was followed through the village all the way to their home by a man who proceeded to let himself in. Thankfully the teenager's parent was at home and challenged the man. At the time of writing this, the man has been arrested and the police investigation is proceeding. If you saw the original post on Facebook, you will have seen that there was clearly some confusion from the attending officers at the time of the incident. I was able to intervene and raise concerns expressed by many of us over the handling of the matter and things began to move rapidly in a positive direction.

I wanted to include this point because I want all residents to know that I am happy to assist with any issue you are dealing with, even if it is being handled by a different agency (Police, Housing Association, Trading Standards etc). Sometimes I may be able to help, other times I may not, but I am always happy to try. So, if you get stuck with anything, just drop me a line.

We hope that everyone enjoyed the summer sunshine, both at home and on holiday. As September begins, it is back to school and work and back to Parish Council monthly meetings, the first of which is on **Thursday 4th September at 7pm** in the Giles Room of the Village Hall. Our public participation section is at the beginning of the meeting, so do come along if you have anything you would like to raise with us.

There has been little in the way of planning applications over the summer. A consultation took place regarding a development of houses behind White Street, but we have yet to see a formal application. This potential development will be for 47 homes in an area that is outside the settlement boundary. The settlement boundary established in the Neighbourhood Plan is there to protect village character and prevent unchecked development. The plan excludes land outside this boundary from general development.

We would encourage everyone to review plans as they arise, as it will affect our village and it is important for everyone to have an opinion, whether for or against.

Over the summer volunteers have been clearing and maintaining our infrastructure of footpaths. Some paths are managed by local householders, whose efforts are unseen and often unknown. Thank you if you are one of those who clears and maintains paths near you. The Parish Rights of Way group meets regularly around once a month to target one or two areas. With a good group of volunteers targeted paths can be cleared in one to two hours. Do join us if you can - the more people that come, the more we can do and the quicker we can do it.

Wiltshire Council is going to monitor air quality and how it is affected by pollution. The Parish Council wants to participate and would like to find three locations to position air monitors. These monitors are around the size of a yogurt pot and would be positioned on the outside of a building, and they need to have access to WiFi. We are interested in four locations: the crossroads (junction of the High Street and Lavington Lane), close to the village shop, close to the Village Hall and playing field, and in the area of All Saints' Church. If there are any households willing to help please get in touch.

#### 2024 a successful year for West Lavington Village Hall

#### ....but volunteers still desperately needed

The Trustees of West Lavington Village Hall held their AGM in July, chaired by Paul Bryant, who said 2024 was the year when the Hall really started to move forward.

The Hall had an average of forty bookings a month from various organisations and individuals, ranging from a solo saxophonist to a large dance group. The Trustees have managed to build the use made of the Hall, which has meant it is back on a sound financial footing. Various local groups are at the heart of Hall use, plus broader groups both from the public and private sectors who appreciate the Hall's facilities. Private individual party bookings have increased – with the additional attraction of ample car parking and the playing areas outside.

Particularly encouraging in the past year has been the return to use of the superb stage by youth theatre groups, dancers and musicians. The Trustees hope one of these groups can be attracted to make this Village Hall their home. During the meeting reports were received from many of the user groups and individuals who expressed their satisfaction at the improvements to heating and lighting, as well as numerous other changes.

The Trustees have also been managing the use of the field and the car park for the Parish Council to maximise use and avoid conflicts.

Mr Bryant gave particular thanks to the support received from West Lavington Parish Council (including the purchase of new comfortable chairs) and the Wiltshire Area Board, whose grant enabled a new radiant heating system to be installed.

Paul reminded those present that the Village Hall is an independent charity and not a part of the Parish Council, and that all those involved with the running of the Hall are volunteers: "We still have some way to go and we need to make improvements to the heating and lighting in the toilets, kitchen and other areas. Hopefully that will all happen before the end of 2025," he said. There were plenty of challenges ahead, but perhaps the biggest was finding people to help run the Hall. "We have been fortunate to attract a small number of very useful volunteers, but we really do need more to spread the load."

It doesn't add up, which is why the national debt is skyrocketing.

Writing in The Times, columnist Matthew Syed argues that a sense of entitlement is holding our country back. As he points out, we all know that more new homes need to be built so young adults can get on the property ladder, but nimbies are quick to protest if their view of green fields and rolling hills is threatened by a new housing estate. Syed's prescription for the 'entitlement epidemic' is a healthy dose of patriotism. But I wonder whether love for good old Blighty is a strong enough force to make a difference.



In his Letter to the Philippians the apostle

Paul urged his readers, 'Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.' Very fine principle. But a sense of entitlement is hard to shift. People are often quicker to demand their rights than fulfil their responsibilities to others. If ever anyone was entitled to anything it was Jesus. Paul describes him as 'being in the form of God', resplendent with divine majesty. Yet he was willing to stoop from the heights of heavenly glory to 'take the form of a servant', coming into the world as man. More than that, Jesus was willing to suffer and die on the cross to save his people from sin.

Those who believe in Jesus are called to imitate his attitude by giving due consideration to the interests of others. I will not only insist on my own right to freedom of speech, but also the right of those who may disagree with me. If I can work, I must work and pay my taxes so that decent public services may be provided for the benefit of society. The Christian vision of life helps us move the dial from self-interested entitlement to a pursuit of the common good.

## **Negative Words**

'The soothing tongue is a tree of life, but a perverse tongue crushes the spirit' (Proverbs 15:4)

A young woman confessed to an older man that she had a problem saying too much about people. He told her to go buy a bird and pluck out its feathers one by one as penance for her sin. When she returned and told the man that she had followed his instructions, he said, "Now go back and pick up all the feathers."

"I can't do that," said the girl. "The wind has blown them in all directions." "That is true," said the wise man. "Neither can you recall the words that you have spoken." It is impossible to take back something once you've said it.

Try squeezing a tube of toothpaste and then putting the toothpaste back in. It's nearly impossible to do. And it's the same with our negative words once they leave our mouths.

Think before you speak. Always be sincere when giving encouraging words (your words won't go far if your actions don't back them up). Remember, encouragement and advice are not the same thing. And try this, be your best encourager. As the verse says, perverse cutting words crush the spirit. Are you crushing yourself with self-hatred? When you feel discouraged, hand that discouragement over to God. Ask Him to help you. Stop wounding and maiming yourself and others. Words cannot be recaptured once they've escaped our lips. Fortunately, the same goes for kind words, too. Ask God for help and try again. By His grace, your words will become 'a tree of life.'



The Christian life is not meant to be lived alone. Scripture calls us to community, a family of believers who 'spur one another on toward love and good deeds'. (Heb 10.24). Encouragement is how we remind each other of what's true when life gets hard. It's how we lift the weary, comfort the hurting and inspire the hesitant. It's a way of saying: 'You're not alone. God is with you. I am too.' In a world full of criticism, distraction and spiritual fatigue, encouragement is like oxygen for the soul.


