The **Serenata Guitar Trio** is a family group of classical guitarists who give frequent concerts in churches and halls around southern England. Members of the trio are: Cobie Smit (Mills) who studied at the Rotterdam and Den Haag Conservatories in Holland, and has given concerts in Europe, SE Asia, Canada, Australia and New Zealand; Richard Mills, who took up the guitar in his



late teens after studies on 'cello, oboe and bass guitar, attending the Edvard Grieg Academy in Norway; and John Mills, a former pupil of John Williams and the legendary Andres Segovia, who in addition to over 60 years of recitals, has given numerous broadcasts in many countries and for the BBC here in the UK.

We are encouraged not to mow our lawns in May to allow the wild flowers to grow and bloom. This was especially relevant this year with the Met Office informing that this is the driest spring on record. Don't set the mower blades too low so as to allow the wild flowers to set their seed.

There are many insect hatches at this time of the season, including unwelcome greenfly and blackfly. Don't use chemical sprays to control them - we use washing up liquid and water in a spray bottle, which does the job. Better still, let the birds, especially the tits and some finches, major on them to feed their young. Washing up liquid won't harm them.



An enthralling sight in our garden was the discovery of a web full of a dense ball of tiny spiderlings all clustered together. They dispersed on their own gossamer lines when discovered, but soon reclustered again. These were baby garden spiders, being yellow with black on their rear ends.

Remember to keep bird feeders and baths scrupulously clean, as some birds have dirty habits and foul the water, which can infect other birds with diseases, such as bird flu. It's difficult to say how the nesting season is going, as there are many predators and scavengers about. It's doubtful that some species will even be able to keep their population numbers up. We have only seen two swifts and three swallows so far, with no house martins, no cuckoos, no flycatchers doing their aerial displays, no nightingales and fewer warblers singing, apart from chiffchaffs. Species numbers of garden birds are generally low, although robins appear to be doing reasonably well.

At the peregrine falcon nest on Taunton Minster, a last year's fledgling, now an adult, has come back to help feed the this year's nestlings. It remains to be seen whether the parents will welcome this help, or maybe chase him away as an intruder. Has any reader heard of this unusual behaviour anywhere else? You can watch live feed from the web cam on the peregrine nest on Salisbury Cathedral to see how the chicks grow and are fed.

In the past, I have encouraged readers to spend time sitting in their gardens from various vantage points for half an hour or so. You will be surprised at all the different wildlife activities going on throughout the year. The writer is going to do more of this, and after 25 years of writing this column he is going to put his feet up. Should you be interested in taking on this column, please contact the Editor. Last autumn the Government announced Envoys for Nature and Climate: Rachel Kyte CMG is the Envoy for Nature and Ruth Davis OBE is the the UK's Special Representative for Climate. We have not yet seen or heard of any pronouncements, so perhaps a new columnist could do a bit of prodding to reveal aims and objectives.



USE IT OR LOSE IT



The Garden in June Why I'm Not Watering My Lawn

I'm sure we are all noticing how dry it is - the soil is already cracking in places, seedlings are stalling, and the plants in my garden are telling me this spring was too dry, too soon.

Spring bulbs like tulips and daffodils have come and gone in a flash and perennials are shooting up quickly, but not necessarily in a good

way. When they grow fast in dry soil, their root systems don't develop properly and that leaves them vulnerable. The warm weather pushed them on too fast, and instead of a long, gentle flowering period, it's all felt a bit rushed. Pollinators are now struggling to find sources of nectar. Dry soil means fewer worms and fewer insects, which has a knock-on effect up the food chain.

We're seeing a pattern now: wet winters followed by dry, early springs. Climate change isn't some far-off thing, it's here, reshaping our growing conditions right now.


Here are a few simple steps that make a real difference:

- Mulch your beds: Compost, bark, whatever you've got. It keeps the moisture in and protects plant roots from temperature swings.
- Water at the right time: early morning or evening is best.
- Choose your battles: don't try to keep everything lush. Focus on what really matters: food crops, new plantings, and wildlife-supporting flowers.
- Don't water your lawn: Lawns are tougher than they look. They'll turn brown and become dormant when it's dry and bounce back when the rain comes.
- Choose the right plant: Choose resilient plants that can tolerate both wet and dry conditions, such as ferns, irises, astilbe, geum, salvia guaranitica, canna, roses, hylotelephium, hardy geraniums, verbena bonariensis.
- Plant in autumn to give plants a chance to set down deep roots while the soil is moist.

It's time to stop chasing the idea of a perfect, high-maintenance garden and start building something more resilient. That doesn't mean giving up beauty, quite the opposite. It means choosing plants that thrive in your conditions, improving soil health, and thinking long-term.

Well, what a month it has been! I was honoured to be re-elected as Wiltshire Councillor for The Lavingtons at the beginning of the month and I look forward to continuing my work to support our communities.

I have literally just come out of the first Full Council meeting since the elections in May. As you will have heard, the Liberal Democrats became the largest party in Wiltshire with the Conservatives a few seats behind them, followed by Reform, the Independents and Labour picking up the remaining seats. Today was the point at which all elected members came together to elect a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Leader of the Council (who then goes on to appoint their cabinet).

After a tied vote (via secret ballot) for Chairman, 48 voted for the Conservative nominee and the same number for the Liberal Democrats' nominee. The casting vote saw Laura Mayes (Conservative) appointed as Chairman of Wiltshire Council. There then followed another secret ballot where Ruth Hopkinson (Liberal Democrat) was appointed as Vice-Chairman of the Council. Then came the all-important vote for the Leader of the Council which saw Ian Thorn (Liberal Democrats) voted in, beating Richard Clewer (Conservatives) by a margin of just five votes.

The latter part of the meeting was fairly anti-climactic since Cllr Thorn had already publicly announced his Cabinet two weeks ago, which included an Independent Councillor (Jon Hubbard) who gave his vote to the Liberal Democrats in exchange for a paid Cabinet position as the cabinet member for Children's Services.

Having had a chat with many returning and new Councillors of all parties after the meeting, I am very pleased to see an administration formed so that the hard work of running the Council can continue. I wish the new Leader and his Cabinet every success in their respective roles.

It has been an absolute pleasure to serve my community as your local Wiltshire Councillor since May 2021 and I look forward to working with many of you over the coming four years!

The children have been enjoying every moment of the recent sunny days and making the most of all the wonderful outdoor space to play together. The summer term is one of my favourite times of the DAPS calendar as it is always busy! We have SATS exams, school residential trips, inter-school sports tournaments, school sports day and so much more – and just to keep us on our toes, our Ofsted inspection!

Ofsted inspection: We welcomed two highly experienced Ofsted inspectors into school a few weeks ago, who spent two long days inspecting our school. It was a graded inspection and they conducted deep dives into Early Reading, Maths and History on the first day, and Art and DT, Science and Geography on the second. They will make judgements on the quality of education, behaviour and attitudes, personal development, leadership and management and Early Years.

The inspection team spent time with a number of groups of children as well as observing in lessons, lunchtimes, breaks and Wraparound Care. Every single child was an absolute credit to their parents, carers and to our school. Their conduct, friendliness and enthusiasm for school and learning were commendable. The way in which they articulated their learning and their educational experience, as well as how the school staff support them was nothing short of highly impressive. We definitely demonstrated to the inspection team what DAPS is all about. We are unable to share the results of the Ofsted inspection at this time but I hope to be able to do so before the summer. What was apparent is that DAPS is a kind, nurturing, and inclusive school, and that is all I can ask for.

SATS week for our Year 6 children: We feel really proud of how our Year 6 pupils have approached their SATS this month. They have all been calm, relaxed and purposeful, wanting to do their very best, knowing with confidence that is the only thing we ask of them. SATS measure their competence in Reading, Writing and Maths, but not how resilient, kind and compassionate our pupils are, how inquisitive, brave and thoughtful, or how well they sing, draw and create as well as performing and competing in a huge variety of sports.

We have been able to show many new families around DAPS and we have 21 children joining us in Early Years this coming September, plus a few from other schools.

We look forward to welcoming them all into the DAPS family. From September, we will have a few spaces in our Early Years, Year 1, Year 3 and Year 5 classes, so if you would like to come and take a look at our school, you are most welcome.

White Horse Class had a super day out learning more about butterflies, mini beasts and reptiles at Studley Grange. Each child had five workshops, handling a range of creatures and learning about life cycles and habitats as we listened to some wonderful talks about each of the animals we encountered. A great learning experience!

The Travel Plan continues to be an important school development project to promote safer, healthier and more sustainable journeys for our families. By encouraging more walking and cycling we aim to reduce car traffic around the school and create a safer, more pleasant environment for everyone. The Travel Plan has helped us to gather feedback from families, understand travel patterns, and plan effective actions. It has also provided access to funding for bike/scooter storage and exploring local road improvements.

In Y5/6 Photography Club looked at some compositional techniques



and their use in some classic photographs and made some photographs around the school grounds before choosing their favourites for printing. The new iPads capture images at a far higher quality than before and allow us to be really creative in exploring our ideas.

Residential Trip: All our children in KS2 are given the opportunity to go on a residential trip at some point in the year. For Y3 and Y4 this will be a two day/one night camping adventure under canvas at school and bespoke bushcraft forest adventure at Roundwood in a wonderful

environment for shelter building, orienteering, climbing and other activities. Y5 and Y6 children will be going to the Forest of Dean for a residential trip in October, taking part in caving, climbing, orienteering and many other outdoor activities. This is a chance for them to test themselves, to gain independence and to learn more about working as a team.

STEM Club took their magnifying glasses and headed outdoors, using quadrant squares to search for plant producers - organisms that create their own food through photosynthesis. Then, back in the STEM lab, they built simple DIY microscopes to take a closer look at the tiny details hiding in plain sight.

KS2 Holy Trinity Choir and Great Cheverell Community Choir Concert: We are hugely excited to share a partnership concert with the

On Time

EBENEZER BAPTIST CHURCH

Relax if you are given to tardiness. This isn't a piece on the importance of punctuality. Rather, I want to reflect on our relationship to time itself. Although it has to be said that time isn't an easy thing to define. Early Christian thinker Augustine of Hippo puzzled over the question 'What is time?' saying, 'If no one asks me, I know what it is. If I wish to explain it to him who asks me, I do not know.' All he could say is that some events lie

behind us in the past and some lie ahead of us in the future. If nothing at all existed there would be no present.

Augustine proposed that God did not make the universe in time, but with time. God is eternal, existing outside of time. He didn't wait around for ages before creating the world. The clock only started ticking as it were at the beginning of creation. Modern cosmology tends to agree on that point. Anyway, the thing is that we exist in time. Our lives are constantly moving from the past, through the present and into the future.

The trouble is that these days people only seem interested in the present. The past isn't worth thinking about. People did bad stuff back then. Slavery and that. The future will have to look after itself. In 2010 Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg dismissed the idea of building more nuclear power stations as they wouldn't be good to go for another ten years. I mean, who cares what happens in the 2020s? Maybe it's apt that after a career in politics Clegg went to work for Facebook/Meta.

Social media tends to make us focus on the present moment, rather than the past or the future. What's going on now captivates out attention, no matter how trivial. This is an age of momentary celebrity and throwaway fashion. Why bother with the time-consuming process of saving for major purchases? Much easier to take out instant credit to buy on a whim something that flashed before our eyes in an online ad.

There's no escaping time, however. We are all products of our past experiences. What we decide in the present will impact on how we fare in the future. But our history need not be our destiny. God entered our world of time and space in his Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. He came to die on the cross that our past sins and failings may be forgiven. He rose from the dead that those who believe in him may have the hope of everlasting life. God gives us time to seek him while he may be found and call upon him while he is near.


means being forgiving of another person's faults or unkindness. However, the person might just be shy and that means we must be understanding as well.

Jesus' instruction was new; now we are called to love others as He loves us. This is the mark of believers: "By this all people will know that you are My disciples if you have love for one another" (John 13:35).

Jesus loves us selflessly and sacrificially

"Greater love has no one than this, that a person will lay down their life for their friends" (John 15:13). That's what He did for us on the cross, and we are to do the same by loving one another even when it costs us.

Jesus said, "If anyone wants to come after me, they must deny themselves, take up their cross, and follow Me" (Mark 8:34)' Love demands self-denial for the good of someone else. We will sometimes experience rejection and heartache for loving like Jesus, but as His



followers it's our responsibility to love well.

Love comes from God and poured into your heart through His Holy Spirit (Romans 5:5).

The Lord loves forgivingly

When we come to Him confessing our sins and asking for forgiveness, God never turns us away and that's how we are to love one another. We can't love others if we won't forgive them. God is the one who teaches us how to love others (1Thessalonians 4:9), and will be faithful to do it.




